## **Visit**

Portmeirion

The Italianate village and gardens on the shores of Snowdonia make a magical day out, with stunning views over Dwyryd estuary.

- Welsh Highland Railway Travel through pretty villages and Snowdonia's breathtaking scenery.
- 3 Ffestiniog Railway

13.5 miles of narrow-gauge railway previously used to carry slate from the quarries at Blaenau Ffestiniog to the port at Portmadog.

4 Harlech Castle

Explore the magnificent castle of Edward I, which is inscribed on the World Heritage List.

5 Surf Snowdonia

The world's first inland surfing lagoon, with continuous rolling waves – ideal for beginners as well as experienced surfers.

6 Slate mines

Take a tour of the Inigo Jones slate works or Llechwedd Slate Caverns.

7 Bounce Below and Zip World

> A huge underground maze of trampolines, ropeways, tunnels and slides and one of Europe's longest zip wires at Blaenau and Betheda.



## Walk

### 8 Local routes

A good walking route is around Trawsfynydd Lake and to Rhaeadr Ddu (Black Falls). Details of all local walks are available from the site office for a small donation in the charity box.

#### 9 Snowdonia

Snowdonia has some of the most breath-taking views in the country, ideal for exploring on foot. The Llanberis Path takes you to the summit, but there's plenty of other routes to enjoy.



## Cycle

## 10 Local routes

From the site you can access the cycle path that encircles Lake Trawsfyndd, the Coed-y-Brenin Cycle Centre within 10 miles, the downhill extreme cycling trails at Blaenau Ffestiniog and 10 miles of level cycling along the Mawddach Estuary.

## 11 National Cycle Network

The nearest route to the site is 82, Bangor to Builth Wells.





## 12 Betws-y-Coed

This beautiful town has a magical setting with an alpine feel; delight in a diverse selection of eateries and pubs, or browse the boutique shops and quirky art galleries.

## 13 Caernafron

Home to a UNESCO-listed castle, this quaint yet stylish town offers an abundant blend of modern and historic attractions.





A great day out is to Morfa Nefyn on the Lleyn peninsula, a fishing port which can only be reached by foot.

The Glaslyn Osprey project is great, best visited through the spring and summer.

The Cemlyn Tea Room in Harlech is dog-friendly, serves great food and a lovely selection of teas.

Walk from the site to the Rhaedr Ddu Waterfall.

The Bryn Arms Public House is located directly opposite from site, serving excellent food and great drinks with lovely service – dogs are welcome too.

The Grapes Hotel was good for food and dogs were welcome in the bar.

There are lots of beautiful Stately Homes and Gardens around the area.

Abersoch is a lovely seaside town to visit for the day.

We went on the Welsh Highland steam railway as well as the Ffestiniog – highly recommend it for a scenic and relaxing journey – we enjoyed stopping off at one or two of the locations for a wander around.

A fish and chip van visits the village weekly Wednesday tea time.

There is a small shop at Trawsfynydd. Penrhyndeudrath has a Spar, butchers and a post office which sells fresh bread.
